Last updated may 1, 2019. What is omeprazole? Omeprazole is a proton pump inhibitor that reduces the amount of acid produced in the stomach. Omeprazole is used to treat symptoms of gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD) and other conditions caused by excess stomach acid. It is also used to promote the healing of corrosive esophagitis (damage to the esophagus due to stomach acid). Omeprazole can also be given along with antibiotics to treat stomach ulcers caused by infection with helicobacter pylori (H. pylori). Over-the-counter omeprazole (OTC) is used to help control heartburn that occurs 2 or more days a week. The OTC omeprazole brand should be taken as a managing person on a regular basis for 14 consecutive days. Omeprazole's important information is not to immediately alleviate the symptoms of heartburn. Heartburn is often confused with the first symptoms of a heart attack. Seek emergency medical care if you have chest pain or heavy feeling, pain spreads to the arm or shoulder, nausea, sweating, and general bad feeling. Omeprazole can cause kidney problems. Tell your doctor if you are urinating less than usual, or if you have blood in your urine. Diarrhea may be a sign of a new infection. Contact your doctor if you have or are watery diarrhea. Omeprazole may cause new symptoms or worsen lupus. Tell your doctor if you have joint pain and a rash on your cheeks or arms that gets worse in the sunlight. You may be more likely to break the bone while taking omeprazole in the long run or more than once a day. Prilosec OTC (over-the-counter) should be taken for no more than 14 days in a row. Allow at least 4 months to pass before starting the last 14 days of treatment. Before taking this drug, heartburn can mimic the early symptoms of a heart attack. Get emergency medical help if you have chest pain that spreads to your jaw or shoulder and you feel sweaty or light. Omeprazole should not be used if you are allergic to it, or if: you are also allergic to medications such as omeprazole, such as esomeprazole, lansoprazole, pantoprazole, rabeprazole, nexum, Prevacid, Protonix, etc.; or also take an HIV drug that contains rilvirene (e.g. Complera, Edurant, Ovensi, Goluca). Ask your doctor or pharmacist if it is safe for you to use omeprazole if you have other medical conditions, especially: a problem or pain with swallowing; blood or black stools, vomiting resembling blood or coffee; heartburn that lasted for more than 3 months; repeated chest pain, heartburn with wheezing. Unexplained weight loss; Nausea or vomiting, stomach pain. Liver diseases; low levels of magnesium in the blood; osteoporosis or low bone mineral density (osteoporosis). You may be more likely to break the bones in the hip, wrist, or spine during Long-term proton pump inhibitor or more than once per day. Talk to your doctor about ways to keep your bones healthy. Ask your doctor before using omeprazole if you are pregnant or breastfeeding. Do not give this medicine to the child without medical consultation. How should I take omeprazole? Omeprazole is usually taken before eating (at least 1 hour before a meal). Follow all directions on your prescription label and read all the drug guides or instruction sheets. Use the drug exactly as directed. Use Prilosec OTC (over-the-counter) just as it is directed on the label, or as prescribed by your doctor. Read and follow carefully any instructions for use provided with your medication. Ask your doctor or pharmacist if you don't understand these instructions. Shake the oral suspension (liquid) before measuring the dose. Use the dose injection provided, or use a drug dosage meter (not a kitchen spoon). If you can't swallow a whole capsule, open it and sprinkle the medicine in a spoonful of apple sauce. Swallow the mixture immediately without chewing. Do not save it for later use. You should dissolve omeprazole powder in a small amount of water. This mixture can be swallowed or administered through an ng tube using a catheter-tipped syringe. Use this drug for a full period of time, even if symptoms improve quickly. Omeprazole should be taken only 14 in a row. It may take 1 to 4 days before symptoms improve. Allow at least 4 months to pass before starting a new cycle for 14 days of treatment. Contact your doctor if your symptoms don't improve, or if they get worse. Some cases are treated with a combination of omeprazole and antibiotics. Use all medications as directed. Omeprazole can affect the results of certain medical tests. Tell any doctor who treats you that you are using this medication. Keep at room temperature away from moisture and heat. What happens if I miss a dose? Take the drug as soon as possible, but skip the missed dose if it's almost time for your next dose. Don't take two doses at a time. What happens if you overdose? Seek emergency medical care or call the Poison Helpline at 1-800-222-1222. What should I avoid while taking omeprazole? Omeprazole can cause diarrhea, which may be a sign of a new infection. If you are anti-hydropsy or blood idyll, contact your doctor before using an anti-diarrhea medication. Get emergency medical help if you have signs of an allergic reaction to omeprazole: hives; Difficulty breathing, but swelling in your face, lips, tongue or throat. Stop using omeprazole and call your doctor simultaneously if you have: severe stomach pain, diarrhea that is watery or bloody; New or unusual pain in your wrist, thigh, hip or back; seizures (cramps); Kidney problems - little or no urination, blood in the urine, swelling, rapid weight gain. Low magnesium - dizziness, irregular heartbeat, feeling of tension, muscle spasms, muscle spasms, coughing or Feeling, but or new symptoms or worse from lupus - joint pain, rash on the cheeks or arms that get worse in sunlight. Taking this drug in the long run may cause you to develop stomach growth called polyps. Talk to your doctor about this risk. If you use omeprazole for longer than 3 years, you could develop vitamin B-12 deficiency. Talk to your doctor about how to manage this condition if you develop. Common side effects of omeprazole may include: stomach pain , gas ; Nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Or a headache. This is not a complete list of side effects others may occur. Sometimes it is not safe to use certain medications at the same time. Some medications can affect blood levels from other medications you take, which may increase side effects or make medications less effective. Tell your doctor about all current medications. Many medications can interact with omeprazole, especially: this list is not complete and many other drugs may affect omeprazole. This includes prescription drugs, over-the-counter medications, vitamins and herbal products. Not all possible drug interactions are listed here.
